Countering

Bullying

At St. Jude's School we believe:

- Everyone has the right to feel safe and valued.
- It is everyone's responsibility to ensure that this right is enjoyed by all.
- Bullying is unacceptable and will not be tolerated.
- If bullying occurs, we will work with all those involved to resolve the problem.

What is Bullying?

Bullying is being nasty or hurtful to others.

For example, bullying is when a person:

- is called hurtful, racist or sexist names
- is physically harmed or threatened
- is sent nasty notes
- is deliberately excluded
- is teased repeatedly in a nasty way
- is singled out for unfair treatment
- is picked on
- has their property interfered with
- has rumours spread about them

Being nosty and teasing others, just to impress their friends.

Everyone has the right to feel safe

What can you do if you are being bullied?

- ◆ Tell the person to stop
- Go to a safe place (the front office, the library, the duty teacher)
- Play with some other children
- Tell the teacher on duty or your class teacher about it
- Ask someone you trust to help you (like Mum, Dad, peer mediator, big buddy)

Asking for help is NOT DOBBING!

Tell someone if you're being bullied.

SPEAK UP!

Never keep bullying a secret



What will happen if you tell at school?

The person you tell will listen to you and find out what has been happening

Then they may:

- Talk to the person who has been bullying you and ask them to think of ways to solve the problem
- Get them to apologise and agree to stop bullying
- Tell the person's parents what has been happening
- Give a disciplinary consequence
- Make sure the person who is bullying gets help to learn, for example, how to manage their anger or how to make friends
- Problem solve with a small group or the whole class

If you see bullying or if you know it is happening, you can ...

- ◆ Tell the person to stop
- ◆ Take the person being bullied to a safe place
- Find a teacher or adult you trust to assist
- Try to find a safe way of helping out
